MUSIC IN AMERICA

By Hugo Leichtentritt

(This is the second part of a longer article by Dr. Leichtentritt that appeared in "More Books," the Bulletin of the Boston Public Library. The first part was reprinted in the Program Book of January 16 and 18.)

THE FIRST WAVE OF AMERICANISM

GRIFFES'S picturesque, impressionistic program music is not concerned with American but rather with Oriental themes. Other composers of the same period applied what they had learned from Debussy's and Richard Strauss's descriptive music to native topics. Thus the first wave of outspoken Americanism got under way in the twenties. Composers like Frederick Converse, John Alden Carpenter, Deems Taylor, Emerson Whithorne, and others applied illustrative program music to American scenery, landscape, technical achievements, etc. in the form of the symphonic poem or the suite. Most of these scores, formerly much admired, have disappeared from the programs, because their aesthetic basis has become antiquated and has given way to another system. Taste has changed so much that we no longer relish those elaborate orchestral fantasies like Converse's Flivver 10,000,000, which
