ALBERTO GINASTERA holds a leading place in world contemporary music. The most important personality among contemporary Latin American composers, he has transformed the panorama of Latin American music. Internationally acclaimed for his symphonic and chamber works, he has in recent years received the highest critical and popular acclaim for his operas, DON RODRIGO and BOMARZO. A founder of the Conservatory of the Province of Buenos Aires; the Faculty of Arts and Musical Sciences of the Catholic University of Argentina; and the Latin American Center for Advanced Musical Studies in the Instituto Torcuato Di Tella, of which he is Director. Ginastera has been active as teache, writer and impressario, as well as composer. He has been awarded the National Prize of Argentina and numerous other important distinctions. Performed at the international festivals at Frankfort, Oslo, Stockholm, Rome, Madrid, Venice, Salzburg, Warsaw and Washington (Inter-American Festival), Ginastera comes to Hopkins Center following the triumph of his opera BOMARZO at the New York City Opera in Lincoln Center.

EASLEY BLACKWOOD at the age of thirty-five holds one of the most brilliant reputations in American music. Commissioned by the Naumberg, Fromm and Koussevitzky Foundations and by Hopkins Center, his works have been performed by the Boston, Chicago, and Cleveland orchestras. His First Symphony and Quartet No. 1 have won numerous awards and wide public acclaim. A phenomenal pianist, he began a concert career at the age of thirteen and he continues to concertize extensively in addition to his work as a composer and his teaching activities at the University of Chicago.

NIELS VIGGO BENTZON, leading Danish composer, is sometimes referred to as the "Milhaud of the North:" his tremendous creative exuberance, his versatility and command of writing techniques, and the broad range of his oeuvre all suggest this comparison. A piano prodigy, he received acclaim both as a performer and composer by the time he had completed his studies at the Royal Danish Conservatory, where he is now a professor. Bentzon's residency at Hopkins Center marks

Several United States premieres from his prodigious catalogue of some 235 works are being programmed and in three of the four concerts celebrating his oeuvre, he will perform as pianist. Bentzon's Eighth String Quartet, the "Dartmouth Quartet," written on commission from Hopkins Center, will receive its World Premiere on August 22nd.

MARIO DI BONAVENTURA Mario di Bonaventura plans and directs the music program of the Congregation of the Arts, now in its sixth year. The recipient of two Ford Foundation awards, the Lili Boulanger-Dinu Lipatti Memorial Prize, and an award of the New York Philharmonic, Mr. di Bonaventura has distinguished himself as conductor, composer, violinist and pianist. In addition to his activities at Hopkins Center, Mr. di Bonaventura annually conducts and lectures in Europe.

SALVATORE ACCARDO Recognized as one of the great young violinists of our age, Salvatore Accardo began winning international competitions at the age of thirteen. Successively he was awarded first prize in the Vercelli, Geneva and Paganini competitions. He has toured extensively in Europe, the United States and South America, where he has appeared with the London Philharmonic, the Berlin Philharmonic, the National Orchestra of Madrid, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Vienna Symphony, the Montreal Symphony, the Colonne, Pasdeloup and Lamoureux orchestras of Paris and other major orchestras. He records for RCA.

BARRY TUCKWELL One of the world's leading horn virtuosi, Mr. Tuckwell has concertized extensively in all the countries of Europe, Japan, Turkey, Israel, Iran, India and the United States. Since 1955 he has held the positions of principal horn with the London Symphony Orchestra and professor at the Royal Academy of Music. He has appeared at the Edinburgh Festival and on numerous radio and television programs of the B.B.C. His recordings include all the Mozart and Strauss horn concerti, the Haydn concerto, and the Serenade by Benjamin Britten with Peter Pears, conducted by the composer. Born in Australia, Mr. Tuckwell now lives in England. He hold the O.B.E., awarded him in 1965.

NOEL LEE Recognized as one of the great interpreters of Debussy and Ravel, whose complete works he has recorded, winning for the second time France's Grand Prix du Disque, Noel Lee has elicited praise throughout Europe, Africa, North and South America as pianist and composer. He holds an award from the American Academy of Arts and Letters and degrees from Harvard University and the New England Conservatory of Music. In addition to his appearances with orchestra, he has toured for many years with Paul Makanowitzky. His teaching positions include an association with the Cornell University faculty. Mr. Lee has made over thirty recordings in Europe and America.

PAUL OLEFSKY Winner of both the Naumberg and the Michaels Awards, at nineteen Mr. Olefsky was the youngest solo cellist to be engaged by the Philadelphia Orchestra. He concertizes throughout the world appearing annually with the principal orchestras. Mr. Olefsky's fourth summer at Hopkins Center follows his eighth world tour.

HANS HEINZ, noted vocal teacher, brings to his profession the experience of a career as leading tenor with the Dusseldorf, Berlin, Antwerp and Salzburg Operas. In the United States he has appeared with the Boston, Los Angeles and Baltimore Symphonies. He was a composition student of Busoni. Presently he is on the faculty of the Juilliard School of Music.

THE PHILADELPHIA STRING QUARTET, whose members were formerly associated with the Philadelphia Orchestra, recently accepted the first position of its kind created in the United States: it is the official String Quartet of the State of Washington. In addition to presenting some forty concerts in four cities in Washington State each season, the Quartet tours internationally. They recently returned from engagements in the Far East to their first summer at Hopkins Center.



ROLF BEYER of the Metropolitan Opera Scenic Studios will design all of the Dartmouth Repertory Theatre Company professional productions.


RAY COOK of the Anna Sokolow Dance Company will join the Company as Choreographer, Actor, and Instructor in Stage Movement.

## **Dartmouth Film Society**

#### THE FILMS OF JEAN RENOIR

For its sixth summer season, The Dartmouth Film Society honors the work of the great French director Jean Renoir. During a career spanning half a century, Renoir has brought a warm, intensely personal vision of human experience to the motion picture screen. None of his thirty-odd films is without interest; his best productions, indeed, are among the greatest films ever made, and

are universally acknowledged as classics.


Assessing Jean Renoir's position as a film director, critic Pauline Kael observes: "He is the master of the French school of naturalistic cinema. Even the best works of Feyder, Carné, Duvivier, Pagnol, don't have the luminosity of the great Renoir films. (It is one of those ludicrous paradoxes of fame that, even in film reviews, Renoir is commonly identified as the son of the great Impressionist, as if his own light, which has filled the screen for four decades, were not strong enough to prevent confusion.) How can his special radiance be explained? Perhaps it's because Renoir is thoroughly involved in his films; he reaches out toward us, he gives everything he has. And this generosity is so extraordinary that perhaps we can give it another name: passion."

The Renoir series will present examples of the director's French, Italian and American films, including such famous works as *La Grande Illusion*, *La Regle du Jeu* and *The Golden Coach*, as well as a number of excellent productions which, for distribution reasons, have rarely been revived. This is apparently the most comprehensive retrospective of Renoir's work yet presented in the United

States, and it promises many interesting revelations.




